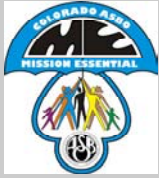

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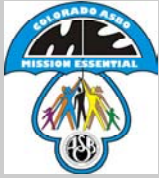

“GENERATION O - bese”

Meet Generation O, children ages 6-19 with unprecedented numbers of obese kids. Over 17 million children in this age group are overweight and over half of them are obese, or dangerously overweight. While hereditary factors can predispose some youth to weight problems, today’s epidemic cannot be blamed on genetics. Our environment drives obesity. Decreased physical activity and poor nutrition and eating habits are causes of this epidemic...not genetics. Recently, The National Association of State Boards of Education published these top reasons for the epidemic. *Processed Foods, Fast Foods, Super-Size Portions, Irregular Meal Patterns, Electronic Media and Less Physical Activity*. Quite simply, we are consuming more processed and fast foods. These foods are generally high in calories, fat and sodium. Kids have increased their consumption of fast foods five-fold in the last 25 years. We are also consuming these and other foods in larger than recommended portions and we are eating less and less together at the dinner table as a family. In addition, children now spend more than 6 hours a day using electronic media and almost a quarter of our children report that they do no physical activity at all during their free time.

So where do we look to begin restoring the health of our children? Since children and adolescents spend significant time at school, it obviously makes sense that one of a school’s goals should be to provide an environment that promotes and models physical activity and balanced nutrition. Such an environment will promote academic success and lifelong health. Changes must be made by schools to achieve this goal. As school districts move forward with their wellness policies, there will be an amplified effort by administrators, educators, support staff and students to provide and support an environment that promotes physical activity and balanced nutrition.

However, it is important to remember that since most eating habits and physical activity patterns are established at home and early in life, parents have the greatest opportunity to influence and change these patterns of behavior that foster childhood obesity. Parents should model balance and moderation, provide healthful food and beverage choices, and promote physical activity. Make fitness and nutrition a part of everyday life; walk the dog, mow the grass, clean the garage. Make exercise a social event; plan birthday parties at the bowling alley, swimming pool or park. Give fitness; choose rewards and gifts that encourage active play and nutrition. Be positive; talk about the days you *do* exercise and eat right rather than the days you don’t. It is important to remember that children learn by example; parents that are physically active and eat right are more likely to have children that do the same.

There is no quick fix for beating childhood obesity, no one-size-fits all solution. It begins with parents who must make small but consistent changes to their families activity levels and eating habits. The consistent and small changes that are vital to reversing the trend that has tagged our next generation of adults as “Generation O”.
